

Bible Study, Titus, Week 8

Day: 1

Read: Titus 3: 8-11

1. Read the whole piece to get an idea of this week's study.
2. Paul is referring back to his short explanation of the gospel in verse 3-7. He says the Word is faithful. Name three reasons why the gospel can be called "faithful"
3. What does that mean to you personally?
4. How can you live it?

Day: 2

Read Titus 3: 8

1. Because the gospel is faithful it has to be used.
2. Titus has to witness about it. How is he supposed to do it?
3. Say if the following is true or not and motivate your answer:
"Someone that does not witness for Christ proves that he or she does not consider the gospel as faithful."

Day: 3

Read Titus 3: 8

We think of witnessing as something you only have to do with non-Christians. Yet, here Paul says Titus must do it especially towards the members of the congregation.

1. When does one have to witness to believers?
2. What is the purpose?
3. Give examples?
4. Do we do it enough?
5. How can we become more aware of our responsibility as far as this is concerned?

Day: 4

Read Titus 3: 8

1. Paul says that the work a Christian is supposed to do should comply with two requirements. Name them.
2. Give practical examples of how your daily program can comply.
3. What do you think Paul means by: "These things are good and profitable to men" and what are their use? What do you think Paul has in mind?

Day: 5

Read Titus 3: 9

Once again Paul wants to warn against the false prophets. "Foolish questions and genealogies and contentions" refers to the Old Testament and the religious meaning these may have. "Strivings about the Law"

refers to the emphasis they lay on the literal obedience of the law of Moses.

1. Why does Paul call these unprofitable and vain?
2. What is not unprofitable and vain but profitable?
3. How can you implement it in your life?

Day: 6

Read Titus 3: 9-10

Titus gets three instructions as far as the false prophets are concerned. He must not get involved in useless arguments, he has to warn them up to two times and after that he must have nothing to do with them.

1. How do you reprimand someone on the wrong path without getting involved in useless arguments?
2. Give three practical examples.
3. Do you have experience in such things? If not, do you know someone that has and that can give you some advice?
4. Share ideas with other Christians when you have the opportunity.

Day: 7

Read Titus 3: 10-11

1. Paul says that there comes a time when a person's duty to witness towards a person persevering in sin. How do you think you are supposed to act towards such a person afterward?
2. Motivate your answer.
3. Decide what this week's study meant to you and how you can answer to it.
